A Few Words from Father Kevin

Dear Friends,

In just a few days more, we shall once again be celebrating the immensely important feast of Christmas, the Nativity of our Lord. There are two approaches to the day. One is focused on the festive ephemera of the “season”: hanging twinkly lights, arranging decorations in green and red, getting all the gifts bought and wrapped. It is all about the *festivity* and can easily become empty\ied of the spiritual foundation of the Christmas celebration.

The other approach is to take “the reason for the season” to heart and make both the season of Advent and that of Christmas as opportunities to prepare our spirits and our daily lives to conform ever more closely to the Way of the Gospel that Jesus proclaimed and lived. Through venerable traditions like the Advent Wreath, the Bethlehem Crib, singing together our favored hymns we do that preparation. Even more, we prepare by prayerfully celebrating *together* in faith, hope, and love, both at the tables of our homes with great feasts laid upon them and at the Tables of the Church, that of the Word and that of the Eucharist where we are nourished by the Good News of God’s coming to us and invited to share the feast of his Body and Blood.

Both approaches have their place in our lives, but the first without the second leaves us on December 26th empty and exhausted, while both together charge us for a new year of life and love with Christ. So in these late Advent days, let us truly prepare the way of the Lord!

A final note: All of us who were able to enjoy the very special Christmas gathering at the home of William and Tae Suk Harper in Dug Dug, Paute on Monday can feel nothing but immense gratitude for the warm welcome, grand hospitality and delicious food that were extended to us. The single word inscribed in the lawn just below the Harper home is a hallmark of what we shared on Monday: **AMOR**.

So, thank you to William and Tae Suk, for the wonderful time together in your home! And thank you to all who brought food and drink to share! And thank you, all of you, for making our little Catholic Expat community in Cuenca such a lovely family to be part of!

The Advent “O Antiphon” for December 21st:

**O Radiant Dawn,
Splendor of Eternal Light,
Sun of Justice:
Come and shine on those who dwell in darkness
and the shadow of death!**

Liturgy Tid-Bit: Advent’s “O Antiphons”

Most of us are very familiar with the Advent hymn, *O Come, O Come, Emmanuel*; Advent would hardly be Advent without this anthem of the season! Fewer of us know that the hymn is actually a compendium of what have become known as the **O Antiphons**, which are part of the liturgy of the Church during the final seven days of the Advent season. An *antiphon* is a single sentence that introduces and concludes a psalm or canticle in the Church’s *Liturgy of the Hours*, (the daily prayers recited or chanted at several points in the day made up of several Psalms, scripture readings, and intercessions).

The **O Antiphons** are those that introduce and end the Canticle of Mary (the *Magnificat*) at Evening Prayer in the seven days before Christmas Eve. Each one pleads for the Savior to come and uses a different title for the Lord taken from the Old Testament prophets, particularly Isaiah. They can be chanted in a variety of tones and styles, often quite elaborate and always evocative of the mystery of the Incarnation that they herald. These titles are: **O Sapientia** (O Wisdom), **O Adonai** (O Ruler), **O Radix** (O Root of Jesse), **O Clavis** (O Key of David), **O Oriens** (O Radiant Dawn), **O Rex Gentium** (O King of the Nations), **O Emmanuel** (O God with us). If you take the first letter of each Latin name and reverse the order — that is, begin with E from Emmanuel, then Rex Gentium and so on you will spell the word **EROCRAS**, which in Latin means “I shall come tomorrow.”
