A Few Words from Father Kevin

Dear Friends,

Christmas in the Codd household was a very big deal! For all eleven of us little ones, the palpable expectation of the delights that awaited us under the great tree on Christmas morning grew ever deeper as the great day approached. A week or two ahead, we would put up that tree in our living room and the smell of fir pitch would fill the area. With precision we would wrap strings of old lights around its girth, then hang the glass balls handed down to us from Dad's family, then, finally, the tinsel went on in globs...in the early years made out of lead, then aluminum, then finally coated cellophane, but always adding that final touch of sparkle to the tree. The crib went up at the same time, an old wood structure covered in bark and a bag of hay to fill in the floor, then the figures of Mary, Joseph, and the animals...Baby Jesus had to wait until the very day.

We would be put to bed early on the 24th, then awakened and readied to go to the Midnight Mass at my Dad's old parish, Saint Aloysius Gonzaga, where all thirteen of us would be squished into the choir loft high above the liturgical goings-ons far below. I remember I had my first "spiritual experience" up in that loft as a kid...the sanctuary below was infused with glory for just a moment or two, but I knew then that God was real and the moment has stayed with me until today. Returned home, we would go back to bed and await the dawn...and the great display of presents under our tree, brought in mysteriously by Santa Clause while we were deep in sleep. It was the one morning where we competed to be the first to rise and clamber downstairs in our pj's to our living room. We had to wait until everyone was there before we could open anything, but we nevertheless were busy checking out the tags and who was going to get what. We took turns opening just one gift at a time...and with eleven of us, that took a while. Most of the gifts were practical: socks and underwear or a new pair of salt and pepper corks for school. But always, there was at least one toy for everyone...maybe two. How did our parents pull this off...the buying, wrapping, and setting it all out without our knowing? It was pure love. A kind of holy family love at its best!

God is in the Manger...

The German theologian, Dietrich Bonhoeffer, who was executed by the Nazis because of his firm and prophetic opposition to their cause, wrote the following about the Christmas mysteries we celebrate this week:

God travels wonderful ways with human beings, but he does not comply with the views and opinions of people. God does not go the way that people want to prescribe for him; rather, his way is beyond all comprehension, free and self-determined beyond all proof. Where reason is indignant, where our nature rebels, where our piety anxiously keeps us away: that is precisely where God loves to be. There he confounds the reason of the reasonable; there he aggravates our nature, our piety—that is where he wants to be, and no one can keep him from it. Only the humble believe him and rejoice that God is so free and so marvelous that he does wonders where people despair, that he takes what is little and lowly and makes it marvelous. And that is the wonder of all wonders, that God loves the lowly.... God is not ashamed of the lowliness of human beings. God marches right in. He chooses people as his instruments and performs his wonders where one would least expect them. God is near to lowliness; he loves the lost, the neglected, the unseemly, the excluded, the weak and broken.
